STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 1: Produce innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for Southern Californians.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On May 1, 2014, the General Assembly adopted a resolution in support of endorsing a regional effort to promote a pedestrian and bicycle safety initiative. To pursue this effort, SCAG launched Go Human, a Regional Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign, with funding from the Active Transportation Program. To extend campaign efforts, SCAG applied for Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety funds from the Office of Traffic Safety in the amount of \$1,250,000 to conduct a fifth round of Go Human safety programming and outreach across the region. On June 17, 2020, SCAG was informed that the grant award was being tentatively offered. SCAG is seeking Regional Council approval to receive the funds.

BACKGROUND:

In the six-county SCAG region, walking or bicycling accounts for 8.9% of all trips, but 27% of all roadway fatalities, according to Connect SoCal, SCAG's Adopted 2020-2045 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). To address this, the SCAG 2014 General Assembly passed a resolution to support a regional safety initiative aimed at improving roadway safety for bicyclists and pedestrians. To



implement the resolution, SCAG secured \$2.3 million in Caltrans grant funding from the statewide 2014 Active Transportation Program call for projects to coordinate a Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

Using these grant resources, SCAG successfully initiated the Go Human Campaign with the launch of a first round of advertising and outreach in September of 2015 as well as three additional grant opportunities through the Office of Traffic Safety to implement safety activities. The advertising campaign has secured almost one billion impressions to date (each time an ad is seen) region-wide through a combination of SCAG's initial investment, added value media secured through op-eds and press outlets, and donated media from local and county partners. SCAG has also completed and extended the other components of the initial grant scope of work which includes implementing a series of Go Human events in partnership with local cities as well as developing toolkits aimed at creating active transportation champions.

To continue the Go Human Campaign's momentum, SCAG applied for an additional \$1,250,000 in funding from the Office of Traffic Safety to extend the campaign into 2018. On June 17, 2020, SCAG received notice that the award was being tentatively offered. If awarded, this funding will be used to conduct a fifth round of safety engagement and programming. Funds will be used to support localized safety outreach for drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists across the region, through the Community Ambassador Safety Program, Resilient Streets Technical Assistance and Mini Grant Program, and Sub Regional Safety Peer Exchanges. SCAG is seeking Regional Council approval to receive the funds.

FISCAL IMPACT:

If awarded, SCAG will receive \$1,250,000 in grant funds from the Office of Traffic Safety that will be utilized for the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

A RESOLUTION OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA SSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS AUTHORIZING THE ACCEPTANCE OF TENTATIVE GRANT FUNDS FROM THE OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY

WHEREAS, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is the Metropolitan Planning Organization, for the six-county region consisting of Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, Riverside, Ventura, and Imperial counties;

WHEREAS, on average, 1,500 people are killed and 136,000 are injured in traffic collisions throughout the SCAG region every year;

WHEREAS, in the SCAG region, 563 pedestrians and bicyclists were killed in traffic collisions in 2016, representing 33% of all traffic fatalities in the region;

WHEREAS, SCAG has applied for an award of \$1,250,000 in Office of Traffic Safety, Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety Funds ("Grant Funds"), to support the Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign;

WHEREAS, the primary goal of the Office of Traffic Safety is to "effectively and efficiently administer traffic safety grant funds to reduce traffic deaths, injuries, and economic losses";

WHEREAS, the Grant Funds will be used for the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign, which will involve consulting services to extend the Go Human Advertising Campaign and support Community Outreach and Engagement strategies focused on safety and resiliency;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Regional Council of the Southern California Association of Governments to authorize SCAG to accept and administer the Grant Funds to support the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:

- That the Regional Council hereby authorizes SCAG to accept the tentative Grant Funds in the amount of \$1,250,000 Office of Traffic Safety to support the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.
- 2. That SCAG's Executive Director or his designee is hereby designated and authorized by the Regional Council to negotiate, finalize and execute all

necessary agreements and other documents on behalf of the Regional Council as they relate to supporting the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

President Richardson called the meeting to order at 1:02 p.m. A quorum was confirmed. President Richardson asked Immediate Past President Bill Jahn to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENTATION

President Richardson provided introductory remarks and welcomed Eleni Kounalakis, Lieutenant Governor of California. Lieutenant Governor Kounalakis provided a presentation on the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, economic recovery and pertinent current issues. She began by reviewing the process and timeline for the State's response, recounting the issuance of stay-athome orders and procurement of equipment. She discussed the May 2020 reopening and corresponding spike in testing positivity rate. She noted recent declines in cases, and looking forward to reopening, she explained the State's four-tier system guiding reopening and the effect of each level. She discussed the corresponding economic crisis, causing a \$54 billion State budget deficit, compared to a budget surplus earlier in the year. Considering assistance to Californians, she discussed state and federal legislation involving eviction moratoria and unemployment benefits. In conclusion, she discussed work being done by Governor Newsom's Task Force on Business and Jobs Recovery, on which she serves.

Furthermore, Lieutenant Governor Kounalakis appraised connected, relevant statewide issues, including the digital divide and its disparate impact on students and communities. She touched upon work with service providers to close the digital divide, and she encouraged members to contact her office with ideas to address this issue. She shared an overview on the status of housing bills and spoke to continuing pressure to ease housing delivery statewide. Finally, she recognized the ongoing fire season, which has seen 7,000 fires in past three weeks. She suggested that the volume and voracity of recent fires is related to changing climate conditions in the state, and she spoke about strategic deployment of responders and equipment to proactively address high winds and weather events.

President Richardson acknowledged challenges being faced by the region and the state as a whole.



He spoke to SCAG's role in long-range planning, resiliency and equity. He highlighted Connect SoCal as the foundation for regional economic recovery, in terms of jobs and capital investments. In conclusion, he discussed housing development, and he thanked Lieutenant Governor Kounalakis for her partnership and presentation.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

President Richardson opened the Public Comment Period. President Richardson outlined instructions for public comments and announced that comments received before the 5 p.m. deadline on Wednesday, September 1 have been posted to SCAG's website and were transmitted to members.

Board Counsel Ruben Duran stated that there were comments received after the deadline. Mr. Duran read three comments received after the deadline into the record for up to two minutes each at the direction of President Richardson.

The first comment was received from Michael Hughes, Hills for Everyone, supporting conservation policies in Connect SoCal and restoration of biological corridors.

The second comment was received from Kevin C. Shin, Los Angeles County Bicycle Coalition, supporting the Connect SoCal Plan and active transportation policies.

The third comment was received from Eugene D. Seroka, Port of Los Angeles, supporting adoption of Connect SoCal and recognizing the necessity of regionally connected infrastructure investments for long-term success of regional points.

Staff confirmed that there were no other public comment speakers, and President Richardson closed the Public Comment Period.

REVIEW AND PRIORITIZE AGENDA ITEMS

There were no requests to prioritize agenda items.

ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

1. Final Connect SoCal Technical Refinements and PEIR Addendum

President Richardson stated that the presentation for Agenda Item No. 1 was posted to SCAG's website and distributed to members. He introduced Kome Ajise, Executive Director, to provide remarks. Mr. Ajise noted work done by stakeholders at the community, jurisdictional and county levels. He thanked members for their consideration of and direction for the Plan. He explained that





the Plan includes approximately 4,000 projects meant to energize the economy while targeting increased housing production and greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reductions. Mr. Ajise then welcomed Sarah Jepson, Planning Director, to provide a presentation.

Ms. Jepson recounted work with partners and stakeholders to create a shared vision for the region, as put forward in Final Connect SoCal. She shared a summary of Connect SoCal, highlighting highlevel benefits, intentions and metrics of the Plan. She reminded members that the Plan is not a guarantee or mandate, and it is a "compass," rather than a "roadmap." She reviewed the 120-day work plan, following the Regional Council's adoption of Connect SoCal for federal transportation conformity purposes only and direction that staff complete certain tasks. Ms. Jepson provided an overview of subsequent outreach regarding COVID-19 impacts, which identified consequences of increased vehicle speeds on local roads and lack of income to cover housing costs. She shared studies that have informed the 2024 Connect SoCal Emerging Issues Outlook, which considers various topics like transportation finance, goods movement, public spaces, e-commerce and the digital divide. She explained the Connect SoCal Implementation Strategy, which is also informed by recent outreach, and pandemic response priorities identified. She outlined local technical assistance resources for near-term support to jurisdictions, such as the Sustainable Communities Program, Housing Program and Go Human.

Ms. Jepson reviewed technical refinements and outcomes, sharing that modeling data was updated to capture growth from entitled project as conveyed by local jurisdictions. Refinements were not regionally significant, and the Plan continues to achieve federal air quality and meet state GHG reduction targets. In addition to technical refinements, staff proposed additional text to clarify that the Plan does not supersede local authority on land use and to emphasize the non-binding nature of Transportation Analysis Zone (TAZ)-level data. She then demonstrated benefits of Plan implementation, including advancing growth in Priority Growth Areas, reducing daily vehicle miles traveled and achieving GHG reducing targets.

Ms. Jepson continued by reviewing the Connect SoCal PEIR Addendum, based on technical refinements and responses to comment letters received from the Center for Biological Diversity (CBD). As there are no new impacts, SCAG determined that a supplemental PEIR would not be required.

In conclusion, Ms. Jepson rehashed Connect SoCal's connection to stakeholder outreach, economic recovery, GHG reduction targets, RHNA process and the COVID-19 pandemic. Finally, she affirmed that Connect SoCal is a living document, subject to amendment and updates every four years.

President Richardson acknowledged the presentation by Ms. Jepson and provided remarks on the Plan. He looked ahead towards Connect SoCal's effects on future generations, builders and concerned individuals. He thanked Regional Councilmember for their work on and consideration of



the Final Plan.

President Richardson opened public comment for Agenda Item No. 1. He limited public comment to 90 seconds per speaker. Board Counsel Ruben Duran stated that there are public comment speakers and introduced speakers in order.

Elizabeth Quiroz, Promesa Boyle Heights, commented in support of Connect SoCal and its goals, such as more sustainable land use patterns and transportation investments. Her comment was made in Spanish and translated by Francisco Romero.

Itzel Flores Castillo Wang, Promesa Boyle Heights, commented in support of Connect SoCal, highlighting the Natural and Farmlands Conversation Appendix. She read her comment in Spanish first and then translated the comment into English.

Tara Barauskas, Community Corporation of Santa Monica, commented in support of Connect SoCal adoption and prevention of delays to RHNA, noting the importance of RHNA allocations to housing development for those in need.

Lauren Borchard, resident, commented in support of Connect SoCal and balancing equity, environmental concerns and businesses.

Josh Gray-Emmer, resident, commented in support of Connect SoCal and preventing delays to RHNA.

Mark Baza, Imperial County Transportation Commission, commented in support of Connect SoCal adoption and spoke about the merits of the Plan.

Leonora Camner, Abundant Housing LA, commented in support of Connect SoCal to allow for the progression of the RHNA process and furtherance of affordable housing development.

Paul Granillo, Inland Empire Economic Partnership, commented in support of Final Connect SoCal adoption and commended the Regional Council and SCAG staff for work done in recent improvements to the Plan.

Maria Salinas, Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce, comment in support of Connect SoCal and commended SCAG staff for engaging the business coalition to provide clarity during the delay period.

Tracy Hernandez, BizFed, commented in support of Connect SoCal adoption, commended SCAG leadership for stakeholder engagement during the 120-day delay period and acknowledged the



Plan's impact on business interests.

Richard Lambros, Southern California Leadership Council, commented in support of Connect SoCal and spoke to clarifications made during the 120-day delay period, while acknowledging the Plan's role as a backbone for economic growth.

Jeff Montejano, Building Industry of Southern California, commented in support of Connect SoCal and reiterated Richard Lambros's comments, stating that many concerns expressed prior to the delay period have been resolved.

Christine Bos, Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce, commented in support of Final Connect SoCal adoption and acknowledged benefits of the delay period.

Kristopher Fortin, Safe Routes Partnerships and Santa Ana Active Streets, commented in opposition Connect SoCal as proposed and asked for additional updates regarding active transportation, public health, and COVID-19 impacts.

Lucy Dunn, Orange County Business Council, commented in support of Connect SoCal and the Plan's adherence with Orange County Business Council's pillars.

Nick Burns, resident, commented in support of Connect SoCal and spoke about the connection between density and affordability.

Josh Raper, Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters, commented in support of Connect SoCal and thanked the Regional Council for its approval in May of the 120-day delay.

Roderick Hall, Abundant Housing LA, commented in support of Connect SoCal and the Plan's role in creating a more equitable society.

Ray Baca, Engineering Contractors Association, commented in support of Connect SoCal adoption and recognized the work done since May 2020.

Elizabeth Hansburg, People for Housing Orange County, commented in support of Connect SoCal and recognized the importance of progressing the RHNA process.

Chase Engelhardt, Climate Resolve, commented in support of Connect SoCal and recognized its role in both the RHNA process and in reducing vehicle miles traveled.

Anthony Dedousis, Abundant Housing LA, commented in support of Connect SoCal and reiterated Abundant Housing LA's speakers by stating the importance of Connect SoCal in the RHNA progress.



Michael Shilstone, Central City Association, commented in support of Connect SoCal and advancement of the RHNA process.

Sonja Trauss, YIMBY Law, commented in support of Connect SoCal, RHNA allocations and dense infill development.

Allison Yoh, Port of Long Beach, commented in support of Connect SoCal and recognized the Plan's role in job creation, quality of life and pandemic recovery.

Board Counsel Ruben Duran announced that there were no remaining public comment speakers. President Richardson closed public comment for Agenda Item No. 1 and opened discussion to Regional Councilmembers.

Regional Councilmember Eric Garcetti, Los Angeles, Member-at-Large, commented on public participation and work done in preparation of the Plan by SCAG staff. He noted that the Plan addresses some of the region's most pressing problems, from health to equity. He spoke about action in the City of Los Angeles to address housing and transportation issues, and he acknowledged the critical nature of today's vote to continue advancing goals. In conclusion, he expressed support of Resolution No. 20-624-1.

Immediate Past President Bill Jahn, Big Bear Lake, District 11, commented on and commended SCAG leadership, Regional Councilmembers and private partners for collaboration on the Plan over past years.

Regional Councilmember Peggy Huang, TCA, commented on Connect SoCal's status as a living document, and she expressed concern about a narrow reach for engagement with community-based organizations during the 120-day delay.

Regional Councilmember Meghan Sahli-Wells, Culver City, District 41, commented on work done by SCAG staff in implementing priorities. She recognized organizations for their comments submitted and pledged support to address issues, such as active transportation and resilience.

Regional Councilmember Carmen Ramirez, Oxnard, District 45, commented in support of the proposed Final Connect SoCal, and she noted implications for Ventura County.

Regional Councilmember Deborah Robertson, Rialto, District 8, commented in support of Connect SoCal and reflected on concerns within the Inland Empire, stressing that Connect SoCal is a living document that should be updated to address such concerns. She closed by thanking SCAG staff for their work.



Supervisor Karen Spiegel, Riverside County, commented in support of Connect SoCal, acknowledged work done by SCAG staff and shared direction for future updates to the Plan.

Regional Councilmember Paula Devine, Glendale, District 42, commented in support of Connect SoCal while noting concerns over RHNA targets and acknowledging that the Plan is a living document that can fit a changing world.

President Richardson spoke to the benefits of the Plan and recognized individuals and stakeholders who have played a role in the Plan over the course of its development.

A MOTION was made (Garcetti) to Adopt Resolution No. 20-624-1 to 1) adopt the Connect SoCal PEIR Addendum and Revised Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program; and 2) approve Connect SoCal in its entirety; and 3) submit Connect SoCal to ARB for confirmation that the Plan meets GHG reduction targets. President Richardson introduced Sarah Jepson, Planning Director, to provide a presentation on both Agenda Item No. 2 and Agenda Item No. 3 together.

Ms. Jepson provided background information on both items, which are guidelines for funding programs supporting the implementation of Connect SoCal. Agenda Item No. 2 considers guidelines for active transportation and safety projects that are part of the Sustainable Communities Program, preceding calls for projects over the year ahead. Agenda Item No. 3, Subregional Partnership Program Guidelines, part of the regional housing program supported by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) using Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) funding. SCAG has 47 million from the REAP program, half which will be dedicated to the Subregional Partnership Program and allocated based on each subregion's share of RHNA allocation. The Subregional Partnership Program funding is intended for updating Housing Elements and accelerating housing production. In closing, Ms. Jepson acknowledged partnerships with subregional agencies and the work of staff in drafting these guidelines.



President Richardson opened the public comment for Agenda Item No. 2, Agenda Item No. 3 and the Consent Calendar. Board Counsel Ruben Duran confirmed that there are no public comment speakers for these items. President Richardson closed public comment and opened discussion to Regional Councilmembers.

Regional Councilmember Peggy Huang, TCA, commented on Agenda Item Nos. 21, 22 and 23. She stated that she made comments regarding Agenda Item Nos. 21 and 22 during Policy Committee meetings, and she expressed desire for further communication from SCAG staff. Regarding Agenda Item No. 23, Draft Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) Allocations, Regional Councilmember Huang commented on recent data on the housing shortage, appealing RHNA allocations and the Litigation Committee

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Recommend that the Regional Council approve Resolution No. 20-625-2 to authorize the acceptance of \$10 million in grant funds from the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) to implement Phase 1 of the Last Mile Freight Program.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 1: Produce innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for Southern Californians. 2: Advance Southern California's policy interests and planning priorities through regional, statewide, and national engagement and advocacy.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The SCAQMD's Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) has created a Regional Goods Movement Program which includes a last mile freight component. SCAG will partner with the MSRC, serving as implementor of the Last Mile Freight Program. SCAG recommends the Regional Council adopt a resolution which would authorize SCAG to accept grant funds in the amount of \$10 million to implement Phase 1 of the Last Mile Freight Program.

BACKGROUND:

Last mile freight is a crucial and growing area of focus with the increasing purchase of goods by consumers through e-commerce, especially in light of COVID-19 related impacts. Goods movement activities are a significant source of NOx and PM_{2.5} emissions in the South Coast Air Basin, causing hazardous air pollution and public health concerns in our region. Accordingly, SCAG's Connect SoCal emphasizes strategies to address air quality through cleaner and more efficient operation of vehicles, largely by modifying or replacing the existing regional fleet of goods movement equipment with cleaner technologies or efficiency improvements. To facilitate implementation of Connect SoCal, SCAG will serve as implementor of the Last Mile Freight Program through a contract with the MSRC, developing a two-phased approach as follows:



Phase 1: Establish a call-for-projects process, focusing on the procurement and commercial deployment of zero-emission or near-zero emission (ZE/NZE) heavy and/or medium duty on road trucks (can include ZE/NZE equipment and supporting infrastructure).

Phase 2: Conduct robust outreach to expand Phase 1 projects and coordinate with both public and private sector stakeholders to deploy broader innovative technologies currently being demonstrated by leading last mile delivery companies, particularly in e-commerce use-cases.

SCAG has been working with the MSRC staff over the course of 2020, and the Last Mile Subcommittee since this past summer, to develop the Last Mile Freight Program, and gain approval from the MSRC Board for a contract award. SCAG staff is seeking approval of a resolution to authorize the acceptance of a grant from SCAQMD to implement Phase 1 of the Last Mile Freight Program, and authorize the SCAG executive director or his designee to negotiatie, finalize and execute related agreements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Current work associated with this item is included in the FY 2020-21 Overall Work Program (OWP) budget under project number 130.0162.18, Goods Movement Planning. After the approval of a contract with SCAQMD, the grant funds will be programmed in the OWP.

WHEREAS, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is the Metropolitan Planning Organization, for the six county region consisting of Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, Riverside, Ventura, and Imperial counties pursuant to 23 U.S.C.§ 134 et seq. and 49 U.S.C.§5303 et seq.;

WHEREAS, the Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) unanimously approved that SCAG implement the Last Mile Component of MSRC's Goods Movement Program, hereafter called the Last Mile Freight Program;

WHEREAS, on September 4, 2020, based on the MSRC action, the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) awarded \$10,000,000 to the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) in SCAQMD funds to undertake the Last Mile Freight Program (Grant Funds);

WHEREAS, the primary goal of the Program is to deploy Zero Emission and Near-Zero Emission (ZE/NZE) heavy and/or medium duty on road trucks (including equipment and supporting infrastructure) for commercial demonstration in the counties of Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino;

WHEREAS, the Program would consist of four distinct activities for SCAG to: (1) develop Program Guidelines and Call-for-Projects; (2) perform screening and selection of project proposals in consultation with the MSRC; (3) develop and enter into Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) with each selected project; and (4) oversee and manage the implementation, monitoring, and reporting on progress of projects;

WHEREAS, the Program is anticipated to be implemented from Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21 through FY 2021-22.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Regional Council of the Southern California Association of Governments, that:

- 1. The Regional Council hereby authorizes SCAG to enter an agreement with SCAQMD, to accept and administer the Grant Funds in the amount of approximately \$10,000,000 to support the SCAG Last Mile Freight Program; and
- 2. SCAG's Executive Director or his designee is hereby designated and authorized by the Regional Council to negotiate, finalize and execute all agreements and other documents on behalf of the Regional Council as they relate to the Grant Funds supporting the SCAG Last Mile Freight Program.

For example, they offered a virtual room outreach solution to conduct outreach meetings, share project information, and allow variability in the level of engagement across communities. They also offered an interactive web tool to identify potential sites for EV charging based on user inputs;
- Their experience with Southern California Edison's Charge Ready program gives them expertise in siting EV charging.
- Provided the best overall value for the level of effort proposed with a proposal that accomplished all project goals at a price lower than originally estimated;
- Proposed the second lowest, most realistic price to perform all the scope of work.

Although one other firm proposed a lower price, the PRC did not recommend this firm for contract award because this firm:

- Proposed to conduct less than half of the community events, and therefore did not achieve all scope requirements; and

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 1: Produce innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for Southern Californians.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Staff seeks to amend the contract of PC Law Group to increase its respective contract value. SCAG's policy provides that the Chief Counsel may enter into legal service contracts on behalf of the agency provided the services are under \$25,000, with said services requiring Regional Council approval should they exceed \$25,000. The subject contract was previously authorized by the Chief Counsel in Fiscal Year 2017-18. Staff seeks to increase the contract value of the firm's contract by \$272,000 for FY 20-21, based on legal services anticipated by the Acting Chief Counsel related to the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) process, implementation of the 2020 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS or Connect SoCal), and California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) matters.

This amendment when combined with previous amendments exceeds 30% of the contract's original value. Therefore, in accordance with the SCAG Procurement Manual (dated 04/17/20) Section 9.3, it requires the Regional Council's approval.

On February 5, 2019, SCAG awarded Contract No. 19-001-C01 to Cambridge Systematics, Inc. to assist staff with developing a Regional Climate Adaptation Framework ("Framework"). The scope of work includes development of tools and resources to assist local and regional jurisdictions in managing the negative impacts of climate change and includes studies and analyses on how the Southern California region can work together to plan and prepare for the impacts of extreme heat, increasingly frequent and damaging wildfires, and other climate-related issues. Over the course of the project, SCAG and Cambridge Systematics, Inc. worked with local municipalities, advocacy groups, and other stakeholders to assess the unique issues affecting the SCAG region, available planning tools and resources, scientific data, and messaging strategies.

Staff requires additional consultant assistance due to impacts of COVID-19 on completion of the Framework and opportunities to expand on previously identified in-person outreach to other modes of communication — including webinars, podcasts, and enhanced web tools — as well as opportunities to produce more comprehensive data analyses on climate change impacts across the region through use of Connect SoCal Growth Vision datasets.

This amendment increases the contract value from \$939,896 to \$1,112,795 (\$172,899).

The total contract expenditures through June 30, 2020 were \$895,412. Based on the new contract value of \$1,112,795, the amount to fund in FY 2020-21 is \$217,383. Funding in the amount \$217,383 is available in the FY 2020-21 Overall Work Program (OWP) budget in project number 145.4834.01.

Basis for the Amendment: Discussions between SCAG and Cambridge Systematics, Inc. revealed the holistic impacts of COVID-19 on the project beyond the initial estimated impacts on the project's outreach components, such as presentations at regional and subregional agencies across the SCAG region. These discussions highlighted opportunities to further build upon the project's outreach component and public-facing deliverables. Since COVID-19 related quarantine will likely continue through the extended contract period, SCAG and the consultant revised some of the previously identified in-person outreach to other modes of communication, including webinars, podcasts, and enhanced web tools, which increased the contract value (approximately \$9,000).

In addition to expanding upon the project's outreach component, staff has a need to ensure the project's data analyses on climate change across the region aligns with the Connect SoCal Growth Vision data through 2045. Staff also has a need for additional analyses on climate change impacts tied to wildfire risk and climate adaptation financing, as well as additional analyses using the most up-to-date data on the region to help provide more comprehensive resources, tools, and analyses for jurisdictions engaging in their own adaptation planning efforts. In order to conduct these analyses, the original project tasks related to the "Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Analyses and Toolkits" deliverables will need to be rerun using the adopted (approximately \$153,000).

Lastly staff has the need to expand on both the outreach components and scenario analyses in light of the "new paradigm" and challenges that COVID-19 and climate change impacts, such as wildfire risk, present to long-range planning for local stakeholders (approximately \$10,899).

The works efforts of this project will provide jurisdictions with a roadmap to adaptation in an effort to help build a more resilient Southern California and help feed into SCAG's development of a "Regional Resilience Framework."

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 1: Produce innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for Southern Californians. 3: Be the foremost data information hub for the region.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Regional Data Platform (RDP) will provide an online tool for SCAG and local jurisdictions to access data necessary for local general plan development and general decision making by monitoring transportation, land development trends, housing and economic growth, and sustainability conditions. Since the RDP project kick-off in May 2020, SCAG and Esri staff have been working collaboratively to move the project forward in terms of project management, tool prototyping, data orchestration, licensing, outreach, and system architecture. SCAG staff will provide an overview of the RDP and how it will be beneficial to local jurisdictions.

BACKGROUND:

The RDP will provide an online tool for SCAG and local jurisdictions to access data necessary for local general plan development and general decision making by monitoring transportation, land development trends, housing and economic growth, and sustainability conditions. The RDP will also feature a data-driven collaboration hub for local jurisdictions to engage with stakeholders for individual projects, such as local and regional land use planning, active transportation planning, greenhouse gas reduction strategies and development impact assessments.



The RDP goals will serve local jurisdictions, other partner agencies, and the general public in southern California to:

- Foster collaboration between SCAG, local jurisdictions, stakeholders, the general public, and local communities by making data used for decision-making more transparent and broadly available;
- Support planning for sustainable growth by assessing the local and regional impacts of land use and transportation choices by benchmarking likely outcomes to regional performance metrics (to be informed by SCAG's regional transportation and sustainable communities planning processes);
- Serve as a primary regional data resource to support regional and local planning, and provide forward-thinking dashboards and innovative tools to end-users to improve and enhance workflows;
- Provide an integrated system for data collection through web-based data services (i.e. data in the cloud), automated update processes, standardized and efficient regional data management, and robust data governance structures; and
- Promote partnerships (e.g., with local governments, regional agencies, state and federal
 agencies, private firms, and universities and international organizations), to establish long
 term collaborative data sharing practices for regionally significant planning activities in
 Southern California, with the aim of promoting a common vision, shared goals, and mutual
 benefits.

- The RDP will provide an online tool for SCAG and local jurisdictions to access data necessary
 for local general plan development and general decision making by monitoring
 transportation, land development trends, housing and economic growth, and sustainability
 conditions; and
- It will also feature a data-driven collaboration hub for local jurisdictions to engage with stakeholders for individual projects, such as local and regional land use planning, active transportation planning, greenhouse gas reduction strategies, and development impact assessments.

STATE

Sacramento End of Session Update

The second year of the State Legislature's two-year session officially adjourned at 1:29 a.m. on Tuesday, September 1, 2020. The start of the year promised to be focused on housing production, environmental concerns, and wildfire prevention. However, with the rapid spread of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Legislature's plans came to a halt and on two occasions was forced into extended recesses to contain and respond to COVID outbreaks within the capitol community. In a typical year, more than 3,000 legislative measures and resolutions would be introduced and debated by the Legislature. Due to the truncated legislative calendar, this number was reduced to around 500.

Leadership in the State Senate and Assembly attempted to advance critical legislation in their respective chambers, but in the end, many of the year's most significant public policy issues failed to move forward. For those measures that were successful, the Governor has until September 30, 2020 to sign or veto them. Although rarely used, the Governor has the power of the "pocket signature" where a bill automatically becomes law if not signed or vetoed by the deadline. The 2021-22 legislative session will convene on Monday, December 7, 2020.

Housing

After the stunning defeat of SB 50 (Wiener, D-San Francisco), the controversial housing bill that would have required cities and counties to change their zoning laws to allow for new, denser





housing near job centers and public transportation, in January, legislative leadership and Governor Newsom committed themselves to advancing some kind of legislation that would address housing production in the state.

In the State Senate, Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) and Housing Committee Chair Scott Wiener lead a package of five bills that they hoped would spur affordable housing production and aid California's economic recovery due to the COVID-19 crisis. These measures included SB 902 (Wiener), SB 995 (Atkins), SB 1085 (Skinner, D-Berkeley), SB 1120 (Atkins), and SB 1385 (Caballero, D-Salinas). All the bills include modifications to existing California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements for housing projects. Some of these bills were held in committee, while others passed both houses of the Legislature but left no time for the Senate to concur to late amendments. None made it to the Governor's desk.

Although the Assembly did not announce a similar "package," four bills aimed at spurring housing production also include amendments to curtail duplicative CEQA review and made other changes to CEQA requirements for housing. These measures were AB 1279 (Bloom, D-Santa Monica), AB 2323 (Friedman, D-Burbank and Chiu), AB 2345 (Gonzalez, D- San Diego and Chiu), and AB 3155 (R. Rivas, D-Morgan Hill and Quirk-Silva, D-Fullerton). The big picture message of these bills is that CEQA is an obstacle to the timely approval and construction of housing. All of these bills were held in committee except for AB 2345, which revises the Density Bonus Law to increase the maximum allowable density and the number of concessions and incentives a developer can seek, is now being considered by the Governor.

Transportation

On the transportation front, the Legislature advanced SB 1351 (Beall) to authorize the State to issue revenue bonds to fund and accelerate certain transportation rehabilitation projects. The legislation would allow the Transportation Improvement Fee Finance Committee to authorize up to \$5 billion in revenue bonds to be allocated to Caltrans to expedite projects in the California Transportation Commission-approved 2020 SHOPP (State Highway Operation and Protection Program) that have also completed environmental clearance and project design. The revenue bonds would be repaid from Caltrans' portion of the Transportation Improvement Fee, an annual fee assessed on the market value of a motor vehicle in California. This bill is now awaiting action from the Governor.

Additionally, to assist transportation agencies that have seen steep declines in ridership and revenues, the Legislature approved a series of statutory relief measures in AB 107 (Committee on Budget), a budget trailer bill. It would provide temporary flexibility in the use of State Transit Assistance – State of Good Repair program funds and would authorize a transit agency to expend funds apportioned for the 2019-20 to 2021-22 fiscal years, inclusive, on any operating or capital costs necessary to maintain transit service levels, provided the governing board of the recipient transit agency makes a declaration that the expenditure of those funds is necessary to prevent





transit service levels from being reduced or eliminated. AB 107 is awaiting consideration by the Governor.

FEDERAL

Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 Appropriations Update

October 1, 2020 marks the beginning of FY 2021 for the federal government. The House has passed all but two of the 12 annual federal agency spending bills. The Senate has not yet introduced any of its FY 2021 appropriations measures. In early September, Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin reached a tentative agreement to use a short-term Continuing Resolution (CR) to maintain government funding and avoid a government shutdown. The House hopes to vote on a spending bill the week of September 21, 2020, and the Senate would take up the CR the following week. It appears a CR would extend past Election Day into mid-December, which is customary during an election year. It will likely be a "clean" CR meaning it will not include any new funding or policy provisions. It is also possible that a one-year FAST Act extension may be attached to the CR.

FAST Act Transportation Reauthorization

The FAST Act authorizes multi-year federal policy for surface transportation, including highways, transit and rail. It is set to expire on September 30, 2020. The House has passed a large, five-year reauthorization bill, the INVEST Act, as part of an even larger infrastructure bill, the Moving America Forward Act (H.R. 2). The Senate passed a section of its reauthorization bills in July of 2019. With the lack of action in the Senate and the looming expiration of the FAST Act, it is now expected that Congress will pass a one-year extension of the existing FAST Act through the end of FY 2021. The extension will likely be attached to the CR under discussions between the Speaker and the Secretary of the Treasury. The extension will likely provide the same level of funding as in the final year of the FAST Act, but there are efforts underway to increase the funding levels if the needed revenue can be identified.

COVID-19 Federal Aid Package

Negotiations on a fifth COVID aid package resumed in late July to find some common ground. By this point the House had passed the Health and Economic Recovery Omnibus Emergency Solutions (HEROES) Act (H.R. 6800), which would provide \$3 trillion in emergency funding to help with the coronavirus response effort. SCAG was supportive of this legislation as it would provide \$915 billion in direct and flexible aid to state and local governments of all sizes. Senate Republicans introduced the Health, Economic Assistance, Liability Protection, and Schools Act (HEALS Act), which would provide \$1 trillion in COVID-19 relief funding. Notably, the proposal failed to include any new funding for state and local governments. By August 7, 2020, talks broke off over cost, funding priorities, and the size of the deficit. Instead, Congress adjourned for a monthlong summer recess.





When the Senate returned after the Labor Day weekend, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell announced that he would hold a vote on a smaller \$500 billion targeted aid measure that would be attached to an unrelated bill on China, S. 178. The narrow proposal would extend supplemental unemployment benefits at a reduced level of \$300 through December 27, 2020, additional funding for the Paycheck Protection Program, and liability protections for schools and businesses as they reopen, however, there was no relief funding for local governments or transportation. The bill needed to clear the 60-vote threshold to end debate. On September 10, 2020, the Senate failed to advance the pared-down relief bill by a vote of 52-47.

The House has no votes scheduled from October 5 to November 15, while the Senate's tentative calendar includes a recess from October 12 to November 6, 2020. This, of course, allows Members of Congress to return to their districts and states for the November 3, 2020 election. However, amid mounting pressure from rank-and-file Democrats to deliver more pandemic relief before lawmakers leave town, Speaker Pelosi announced that the House will stay in session until congressional leaders can reach agreement on a long-stalled coronavirus relief package, possibly cutting short the monthlong recess in the run up to the November election. At this point it is unclear how or when relief legislation will proceed.

Background & Scope of Work:

SCAG is the primary agency responsible for the development and maintenance of Travel Demand and Air Quality Models for the SCAG Region. SCAG uses both models to provide state-of-the-practice quantitative analysis for Connect SoCal (the Regional Transportation Plan and Sustainable Communities Strategy — RTP/SCS), the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP), and Air Quality Management Plans (AQMPs). Staff updates and validates both models for each cycle of the RTP/SCS. The trip-based Travel Demand Model was last updated to TransCAD v6 platform and used for SCAG's 2016 RTP/SCS. In the recent 2020 RTP/SCS, SCAG moved to an activity-based Travel Demand Model on TransCAD v8 platform. But the Travel Demand Model will be maintained for a variety of project analysis in the region and sub-regional model developments. The Travel Demand Model is also the foundation of the Sub-regional Model Development Tool (SMDT).

SCAG provides modeling support and services to SCAG member agencies, transportation commissions, subregions, and Caltrans. Staff uses the SMDT to enhance SCAG's service quality and efficiency. The SMDT streamlines the development of models for agencies wishing to create subregional models based on SCAG's Regional Model. It also promotes model consistency between the Region's various modeling agencies and greatly reduces the cost and effort required to create subregional models. The current SMDT is built on TransCAD v6 platform to be compatible with the Travel Demand Model.

Since the Travel Demand Model network format and the assignment stage of SCAG's new Activity Based Travel Demand Model are built on the newer version of TransCAD software (v8), some functions and file format of TransCAD v8 are not compatible with the current TransCAD v6. The objective of this project is to update the SCAG Travel Demand Model and the SMDT to the same software platform (TransCAD v8) as SCAG's Activity Based Model.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 7: Secure funding to support agency priorities to effectively and efficiently deliver work products.

AUDITS:

External Financial Audit

Eide Bailly LLP, SCAG's outside independent auditor, is presently conducting final audit fieldwork and the audited CAFR and Single Audit Report will be released in December.

MEMBERSHIP DUES:

As of September 15, 2020, 119 cities and 4 counties had renewed their memberships, 65 of whom took advantage of the 20% dues waiver. 61.3% of the assessment has been collected. This leaves 69 cities and 2 counties yet to renew. Three cities are being recruited for membership. Second reminders will be sent in early October.

BUDGET & GRANTS (B&G):

On August 31, 2020, staff submitted the Fiscal Year 2019-20 (FY20) Overall Work Program (OWP) Year-End Package to Caltrans, which included the certification of final expenditures, the final progress report, and the final work products for projects completed in the fiscal year. The final expenditures reported for the year were \$44 million or 48% of the OWP budget.

On September 3, 2020, the Regional Council approval formal amendment 2 to the FY20 OWP in the amount of \$248,220 which increased the OWP budget from \$89.2 million to \$89.5 million. This amendment includes adding a new grant for the Interstate-710 North Mobility Hubs Plan under the FY21 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program; reprogramming FY21 SB-1





Formula Grants for the Sustainable Communities Program and reducing Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds. Staff submitted the complete amendment package to Caltrans on September 11, 2020.

CONTRACTS:

In August 2020, the Contracts Department issued four (4) Request for Proposals; awarded five (5) contracts; issued six (6) contract amendments; and processed 25 Purchase Orders to support ongoing business and enterprise operations. Staff also administered 141 consultant contracts. Contracts staff continued to negotiate better pricing and reduced costs for services. Thus far in FY21 staff negotiated approximately \$531,616 in budget savings.





Interest Earnings Variance





At month-end, 67 invoices remained unpaid less than 30 days.


OVERVIEW





Summary

As illustrated on the chart, the Contracts Department is currently managing a total of 143 contracts. Fifty-nine (59) are Cost Plus Fee contracts; forty-two (42) are Lump Sum (formerly Fixed Price) contracts, and the remaining forty (40) are Time and Materials (T&M) contracts (includes Labor Hour and Retainer contracts). The Contracts Department anticipates issuing approximately eighty (80) contracts for FY 2020-21. Note, due to the nature of SCAG's work, the majority of SCAG contracts have a one year term and end on June 30th each year.
